All WCHS IB students choose 2-6 subjects in 6 groups & participate in the "core".

This includes an extra-curricular <u>C.A.S.</u> program as well as 50 hours (partial IB) - 100 hours (full IB) of the <u>Theory of Knowledge</u> curriculum. The <u>Extended Essay</u> (over Grade 11/12) is mandatory for full IB students <u>only.</u>








Who should choose IB...? Students excited about learning!!

- Full diploma IB students should be efficient, self-motivated students who are not currently challenged and love delving deeper.








- Students with academic integrity

- If something is hard, brain research shows you need to work that part of your brain extra hard before age 20 to maximize potential for life-long learning.
- You get to work with like-minded students.
- Universities appreciate students taking enriched curricula (apply as an "IB Student").
- Advanced credit or advanced standing may be given based on performance on IB exams.
- Qualify for more scholarships
- The IB Diploma is seen as the "classic" liberal arts education by post-secondary institutions.

French Immersion IB







- French Immersion IB courses and the full Bilingual IB Diploma are only offered at Western so any F.I. "resident of the CBE" can apply
- French Language Arts will need to be one of the chosen IB classes (Math and Social Studies will be the only other two subjects taken in French).
- Francophone, early & late immersion students are all together in classes
- Science, ELA, PE, and options are all in English

French Immersion IB FAQ's









- Can I apply for F.I. IB, but take S.S. and Math in English? No
- Can I apply for partial IB in French Immersion?
 - Yes, you can take any (2 or more) IB classes you like (one of which must be FLA IB).
- Can I apply for FI IB from an English school? No
- Can I switch from French Immersion "regular" to Partial English IB to stay at WCHS if French Imm. is too hard?
 - There is a process in place if we have space.
- Can I apply for English IB and still take FLA IB?
 - not possible as FLA is part of a whole program
 - students who switch to English can take Spanish or Chinese IB or can "challenge" Alberta FSL 30 credits (Gr. 10) and continue to FSL 30-6y IB (Gr. 11) and FSL 30-9y IB (Gr. 12) as an alternate pathway to French B HL.
 - Students who do not get offered a place in the English IB programme can still do regular French Immersion
- Don't forget to fill out the transfer if you are switching to the English IB program from F.I.










- Go to <u>www.cbe.ab.ca</u> under the Registration tab and "Forms you need"
- Students email the CBE area IB school for their primary residence an "E of I" between Feb 1 – Mar 15 (must live with a legal guardian).
- Email <u>westerncanada@cbe.ab.ca</u> (***please don't c.c. me or anyone else at the school)
- Please email the E of I and Grade 9 interim report card together in one email
- Please attach documents as .pdf or .doc (no links to a Google drive, please don't embed photos into the body of the email).
- Leave the CBE # blank if it hasn't been issued.



The School Engage Process







Students who are not currently in a CBE school must register with the school board through the on-line School Engage process.

- Register for the regular English or French Immersion program at the designated CBE high school.
- This cannot happen until next year's registration opens (~Jan. 18)

Not A CBE Student?

If you are **not** a CBE student with a valid CBE Student ID, please follow the prompts below to first register at your designated regular program school and be assigned a Student ID number. Student ID numbers will be updated in your SchoolEngage account **after Feb.**21 and you can then proceed with a transfer request.





On-line transfer (for CBE and non-CBE)



- A current CBE # is required (start School Engage at your designated regular program CBE high school early and CBE #'s should be ready by the end of February)
- The CBE will send confirmations of transfer approval in mid to late April. (10 days to accept)













Transfers

The IB programme at Western will have a cap of 250 Grade 10 students next year.

Order of acceptance:

- French Immersion IB
- Western's regular boundary
- IB boundary English IB
 - A draw may be necessary if there are more than 250 applicants. Students not offered a place at Western may be offered a spot in another IB programme.
 - A limited number of excellent Grade 11 students may be accepted to transfer into IB

Moving into the area before March 15









- Our IB programme will be filled using the March 15th applicants.
- Ensure the current middle school has your correct address.
- CBE schools may need to re-designate.
- The IB area will still require the transfer by the March 15th deadline.

Committing to the IB programme







- WCHS will send you a guide on choosing courses even before transfers can be approved (this is not official acceptance from the CBE).
- We will have virtual course selection workshops for which you can sign up so you can ask questions and get feedback on your choices.
- Students will be re-directed to their regular program designated school in Grade 11 should they not continue into IB.
- Choose your program carefully as all IB courses (even the IB Options) are highly academic.

No Entrance Exams









- There are NO entrance exams or placement tests to get into IB or particular IB courses.
- We do look at Grade 9 interim report cards to counsel students on course selection.
- Junior high teachers and staff should counsel students on course choices, and we are also available to do the same during our virtual course selection workshops.
- Ask the junior high teachers if they think IB would be a good fit for you.
- Mandated IPP Accommodations are possible in the IB program.

IB Courses are very challenging



- Congratulations on making the decision to commit to the IB programme!
- 10/20/30 IB courses also include Alberta curriculum
- Students should assume they will attend tutorials before and after school every Monday-Thursday to maximize potential for success. (8:40am- 9:00am and 3:20pm – 3:40pm)
- Students are encouraged to form study groups and should start working hard from day 1.
- We can definitely make adjustments to some students' programs after they have done a semester (as long as 2+ IB courses continue).
- Other supports are available (peer tutors...).










Frequently asked questions....

- What if I move into the IB boundary in the spring? summer?
 - There is a "Change of Address High School Transfer Request" Online. You should already be enrolled in an IB programme at your area IB school. Late placement in our IB programme is not guaranteed.
- What if I am an elite athlete/musician; will I have time for IB?
 - -It is definitely possible, but ask yourself, how busy am I now?
- What if I already have some Grade 10 courses?
 - Math 10H is still recommended unless students receive 90%+ but please discuss this during course selection time.
- What if I want to change course selections in the summer?
 - We are closed over the summer and would like students to commit to the courses they have chosen for at least the first semester. There is a timetable change request process.
 - -Please look at your timetable in August and if first semester is "heavier" than second semester, we will try to balance it upon request. Some students get 4 cores scheduled by the computer!
- What if I decide IB is not for me, right away, as soon as I start?
 - We timetable based on March course selections and cannot accommodate most timetable switches in the fall <u>even</u> if you move to our regular designated boundary. Any possible course changes must be completed in the first week of the semester. Grade 10 students are not allowed to have a spare, so dropping classes is not possible.











- Group 1: English Literature
- Group 2: Spanish & French (beginner, experienced and F.I. will start in different classes). Chinese H is offered on Saturdays through The Chinese Academy.
- Group 3: History of Europe (combined with Alberta Social Studies), Philosophy, Business & Management
- Group 4: Biology, Chemistry, Physics
- Group 5: Math Analysis & Approaches (Math Applications & Interpretations is supported)
- Group 6: Visual Art and Band

IB vs. AP







- IB can be taken as individual courses (like AP) or as a full high school diploma.
- IB courses have an inquiry based internal assessment (~25%) and final exams (~75%) whereas AP accreditation is based on exams only (this helped IB grant diplomas and credits during COVID)
- IB has a CORE with CAS, the EE, and ToK
- The IBO has a university recognition department, renews their curriculum on a 7 year cycle, has mandatory professional development, and rigorously evaluates their schools every 5 years.

The Full IB diploma









- Must take 6 IB subjects (3-4 at the higher level)
- One course in each group (1-5) plus one extra course from group 1 - 6 (third language, second science, Philosophy, Art, Band, Business...)
- The CORE is evaluated as part of the diploma
- May qualify for automatic scholarships, early entrance to university ...
- Advanced credit, apply with IB grades and Alberta grades (schools evaluate both).
- Bilingual diploma possible
- \$25 annual fee
- ~\$200 per exam course (6 x \$200 = \$1200 paid in Grade 11/12)
- Our average IB diploma score is 37+ / 45 points and ~50 students complete the diploma each year.

Partial IB ("IB Courses Student")









- Complete 2+ IB courses to the exam level based on interest / passion (you may not have IB every semester)
- Easiest way to get 3 IB Sciences
- You may drop from full IB to partial IB (only at the end of semesters / years)
- Advanced credit, apply with IB grades and Alberta grades...
- \$25 annual fee
- ~\$200 per exam (in Grade 11 or 12)
- 200 250 partial IB students in each of Grade 11 and 12
- Benefit from rigour, knowledgeable classmates, different types of assessments

Course Progressions









- Not every combination is possible.
- There are a maximum of 8 time slots per year and some classes are only offered in a particular semester.
- Students choose their potential IB subjects in the spring of Grade 9 to make their Grade 10 timetable and will meet with a guidance counselor in the fall of Grade 10 to make adjustments during 3 year planning.
- We make every effort to "balance" the difficulty of the two Grade 10 semesters.
- Honours courses in Grade 10 are usually given the designation "cohort IB" on the timetable.



History of The Chinese Academy

The Chinese Academy started in 1997

- Accredited by Alberta Education
- Alliance with the Calgary Board of Education to provide International Baccalaureate (I.B.) Chinese Program
- To offer Mandarin and Cantonese classes from Kindergarten to Grade 12
- To offer Chinese as a Second Language (CSL) classes in the afternoon
- To offer option classes such as English and Maths Tutorials, Adult Mandarin/Cantonese, badminton, ballroom dancing etc. to our students and parents

- First certificated teacher to pilot the Chinese IB program in Alberta
- Over 30 years of teaching experience in Canada

What full IB students don't normally have time for:

- Electives in Grade 10 (except band or choir) – non-IB Band and choir are specifically timetabled to include IB students as classes are offered "outside of the regular timetable")
- Phys-Ed after Grade 10
- Three I.B. Sciences (most Science enthusiasts will take at least one summer school class to complete a third non-IB Science)
- CALM is usually taken on-line during Grade 11 (outside of the timetable)











- Most universities recruit IB graduates. (Though, in general, universities want all of our Alberta grads!)
- Universities will generally evaluate both the IB and Alberta marks and choose the most advantageous to the student.
- (Full IB they will look at the total IB points /45, Partial IB – they may convert the IB grade out of 7 to a percentage grade for the admission average)
- <u>UBC</u> 15% of their undergraduate population is made up of IB grads
- *Google your university of choice with the term "IB recognition" or take a look at the links on our IB page.











- \$2000 for IB diploma students with 35+ points
- Earn up to a full year of university credit (partial IB can take credit for HL classes with a minimum of grade 5-6)
- Conversions:

IB 7 – Alberta 100%

IB 6 – Alberta 91%

IB 5 – Alberta 83%

IB 4 – Alberta 75%

What I.B. Students have said...
